## **LU-24-027 IN-PERSON TESTIMONY** SUBMITTAL COVER SHEET

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I'm Keith Lembke - the royal opposition. I've lived at 39046 Trillium Lane, Corvallis, OR 97330 since 2003. It's 3/4 mile from Coffin Butte. I am the Chairman of the Benton County Republicans and speak for their consensus, I have a Doctorate in Public Administration and over forty years of experience in public service. I will discuss why we are against the expansion.

Hard to believe, but there has never been a public referendum on the regional landfill. Historical records of city council meetings indicate the lack of "significant" pushback to the expansions as unanimous consent.

That's not a fair assumption.

The regional landfill paradigm started in 1974 with the Chemeketa Region Solid Waste Plan. The county

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residents consented to temporarily bring in five counties of refuse in exchange for the other four counties collectively creating an advanced waste management system. While waste delivery to Benton County proceeded, the rest of the plan did not. Since its from 1974 to franchising in 1985, Coffin Butte has incrementally 5 to 20+ evolved to receive waste from 20+ counties. Through

that entire evolution- not one county referendum. NOT A SINGLE ONE. entire community. That's the normal war a political technique to learn what the consenses is, t I understand the theory of the tyranny of the majority,

but still how can a representative government decide what is best without at least considering the constituent's consensus. Especially for something that will affect the county for the next several hundred years. You've seen handred a move years.
