I also want to comment on the fact we have seen the landfill on fire. One night we saw a glow in the sky, followed the brightness and were shocked to see what had happened. The whole landfill was on fire, it plussed and glowed looking like a huge brain. You can imagine with videos of wildfires destroying towns and rural areas how scary this was. We live 3 miles from the landfill it would not take long for a fire to reach us.
